Career Guidance and Placement Cell Report

This year, a total of 303 students have secured placements in various multinational corporations (MNCs), marking a successful placement season.

Placement Summary:

The placements have spanned a diverse range of industries, with students placed in renowned organizations. The distribution of placements is as follows:

Department of Aquaculture The Department of Aquaculture has strengthened its international collaboration by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Gorgan University of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources (GUASNR) in Iran. This partnership aims to enhance research and educational opportunities in aquaculture. Additionally, the department conducted training sessions on ornamental fish culture for VHSE students from the Government Regional Fisheries Technical VHSS in Thevara, equipping them with essential skills in aquaculture. **Department of Botany** The Department of Botany organized a one-day workshop titled **"Mushroom Infotainment"** in collaboration with **Coonfresh, TMJ Foods, India Pvt Ltd**. The workshop attracted a total of **156 participants**, including **28 members** from outside the campus. This initiative provided valuable insights into mushroom cultivation and its various applications.
